





Interview Answers

Why did you write *The Rail Splitter*, and what do you hope readers take away from it?

I wrote *The Rail Splitter* because I love Lincoln, and I want others to know and love him, too. I'd like readers to feel like they've walked beside him on his journey from a log cabin to the White House. And to remember that America is the place where extraordinary journeys like Lincoln's unfold.

What made Lincoln such a great leader and president?

I'd zero in on a handful of virtues he possessed. First, he had an incredible ability to persevere, which is something he learned growing up on the frontier. Second, an eagerness to learn. He was one of our least prepared presidents to take office from the standpoint of formal education, but he learned on the job. Third, compassion. Fourth, he had great people skills, including his sense of humor. Fifth, integrity. Sixth, patriotism. He loved this country and was deeply dedicated to our nation's founding principles. And finally, faith. His faith not only gave him the strength to make it through the war, it helped him have the wisdom to be a great leader.

Where did your love for Lincoln stem from?

He's been my hero from history since I was a kid. When I was young, my mom used to read to my siblings and me. I remember her reading about Lincoln from books like the old *Childhood of Famous Americans* series. I was fascinated with those stories about the young Abe splitting rails and walking miles to borrow books on the frontier.

Interview Answers

How long did it take you to write *The Rail Splitter*?

I first had the idea for a novel about Lincoln around 2006. My original idea was a giant novel that covered his whole life, but that turned out to be impractical for several reasons. In the end, the part of the manuscript depicting the last five years of his life was ready first. That became *Old Abe*. The earlier part of his life became *The Rail Splitter*. Of course, I haven't worked on all this full time since 2006. Sometimes the manuscripts sat in a drawer for months at a time. It's been an on-and-off effort, as books often are. My wife jokes that from conception to publication, it's taken about four times as long to get these two books published than to fight the Civil War.

What's different about this Lincoln book?

I hope it brings him to life in a way other books do not. Thousands of books have been written about Lincoln. By some accounts, more books have been written about him than anyone except Jesus. The overwhelming majority are nonfiction. I wanted to write a novel because fiction can paint an image the way nonfiction can't.

What surprised you the most when researching Lincoln's life?

He was a man of incredible faith. I wasn't expecting that when I started this book. His religious views have been a topic of debate for a long time. He went to church quite a bit, but he never joined a church, and he was never baptized. But he loved the Bible. He came to view himself, as he put it, as a "humble instrument in the hands of the Almighty." I don't think he would have made it through the war without a deep faith.

Interview Answers

What do you admire the most about Lincoln?

Probably his perseverance. His whole life, he just plain persevered. He grew up on the frontier, where you pretty much persevered or died. He persevered through the hardest four years any president has faced. He used to say that he was like a man trying to keep a tent up in a storm. Every time he got one of the tent pegs hammered into the ground, the storm blew out another, and he'd have to run around to the other side of the tent to peg it back in. He told people that he just kept pegging away, pegging away.

How much of *The Rail Splitter* is fiction, and how much history?

Like all historical novels, it's a mix, but I spent a lot of time and care trying to make this as true to Lincoln's life as possible. So there's a lot of history in this book. Just about everything I depict actually happened. Much of the dialogue is based on interviews, letters, speeches, and reports from Lincoln's time. But I used my imagination to fill in details in the dialogue and events.

Why is knowing about Lincoln and other American heroes important?

It's important because, first, remembering those heroes and knowing their stories helps us understand the principles and beliefs that underlie American democracy, how those principles were established, and how hard it has been to defend them over the years and extend them to millions more people, both here and abroad. Second, honoring those old heroes helps us remember why this country is so unique and extraordinary, and why we should be grateful to live here.
